


















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For the grand finale of the program, we were surprised and delighted when a small cannon was fired out over the water. It was a dignified and appropriate way to end the ceremony.



The project was part of Chicago's Christmas Ship, an annual effort to provide trees to families that cannot afford them. This was the first year the Thompson group was involved with the campaign, but members pledge to make it a yearly occurrence. The committee's involvement gave members the chance to promote Schoolcraft County and make a direct connection between the current project and the most famous Christmas Tree Ship — the ill-fated Rouse Simmons, which sailed from Thompson in 1912, loaded with Christmas trees for Chicago, only to go down with all hands in a Lake Michigan gale.

Christmas Tree Ship sails again

THOMPSON — For the
first time in nearly a century,
holiday trees from the Upper
Peninsula were taken by ship
to Chicago this month — retracing the journey of the
famed Rouse Simmons, the
three-masted schooner called
the Christmas Tree Ship.
The sojourn was made possible with the help of the U.S.
Coast Guard icebreaker Mackinaw, working to benefit hundreds of needy families.
"It's been a dream come
true," said Meg Wnuk, of
Thompson. "We've always
had a goal of getting some
trees back onto the Christmas
Ship and this year it came
true."

Christmas tree," Jasmin said. "The trees were unloaded from the ship by volunteers. They were loaded onto trucks and then the trucks would deliver them to distribution points."

This year, there were 1,100 trees purchased by the Coast Guard and brought to Chicago, along with two dozen trees that were donated from the Thompson area and given special attention throughout the

Each of the trees from Thompson - from balsam fir to blue spruce - was wrapped specially and bore a tag from the donors. Jasmin said the Thompson trees were referred to as "the official trees."

The trees were trucked from Schoolcraft County Cheboygan. Next year, the committee hopes the Coast Guard will pick up trees from nearby Port Inland, further strengthening local historical

Some of the committee members traveled to Chicago, stopping along the way to see places significant in the history of the Rouse Simmons.

"It was an exceptional experience," Jasmin said. "The Coast Guard and the people in Chicago treated us so gracious-

Jasmin said they wanted to leave a donation with the Chicago Christmas Tree committee organizers, but the group responded by saying, 'money is nice but you've brought something to us that we didn't have before, and

that's history."

Jasmin said Thompson area residents are already inquiring about getting more trees for next year.

"The excitement in the community has really been reward-

ing," Jasmin said. Wnuk said the committee wants to keep the tradition alive and growing, undoubtedly looking toward the centennial of the Rouse Simmons sinking in 2012.

"If this makes somebody's life brighter at a tough time of the year, that's really terrific," Wnuk said.
